We write at the end of November when there are unmistakable signs that winter is fast setting in. November has always been a busy month for the School and so it has proved this year. Our main preoccupation has been examinations. The School Examinations gave over on the 22nd November but, unfortunately, the Cambridge Examinations are still on us and those of us who are taking it are burning the midnight oil and hoping that our labours will not be in vain. A few of us, who are in the N.C.C. and who are taking the Cambridge examinations, are still here, working hard.
